Logical Consequences

As a kindergarten team, we use "logical consequences". We believe that all students are capable of behaving well at school. If a student does not make a good choice, we assign him/her a logical consequence to help teach the correct behavior. Below there are examples of logical consequences. The teacher may decide to assign one or more of the possible consequences.

Behavior	Consequence
Running/talking in the hallway	-go back and try again -practice walking quietly at recess for 3 minutes -complete a "think sheet"
Being disruptive during a lesson	-sit separate from group until body is calm -write a letter of apology to the class -complete a "think sheet"
Playing/making a mess in the bathroom	-clean up mess -write a letter of apology to the custodian if needed -complete a "think sheet"
Too loud/disruptive at lunch	-sit separate from the group -complete a "think sheet"
Poor behavior at specials	-write a letter of apology to the teacher during snack/recess
Work refusal	-finish at recess or at home
Not being a kind friend	-write a letter of apology -independent recess
Not being safe with an item (ex- chair, scissors, etc)	-lose privilege of that item for a period of time
